• Laura Wishart provided a recap of the May 2023 CoP Jamboard Session.

Enhanced Care Management and Community Supports for the Pediatric Population of Focus

- Trudy Bearden, HIP Consultant shared the populations of focus for ECM and CS, highlighting that the population of focus now include pediatric patients.
- Trudy reviewed the CalAIM ECM Policy Guide eligibility criteria for children and youth.
- Trudy shared resources for ECM and CS information and services.

Centering Wellness: The Role of Schools in Addressing Behavioral Health

- Lauren Fein, Director of Behavioral Health from the Santa Cruz County Office of Education shared the initiatives to address the need for behavioral health services in schools.
- Lauren highlighted the gaps in services.
- Lauren shared the ongoing efforts and initiatives at schools to address gaps in services.
 - COE is providing staff, parent, and student training (ie. Youth Mental Health First Aid, Peer Support Groups, etc.)
 - The Companion Project resulted from unsuccessful referral processes and led to COE training staff to provide the behavioral health services themselves through appropriate training.
 - Providing care management services to link students to behavioral health resources.
 - COE's goal is to open wellness centers at all high schools by Spring of 2023/24 school year.
 - The purpose of including wellness centers in schools is to connect students with counseling, mentoring, peer-to-peer support regardless of insurance status.
- Lauren reviewed the multi-tiered systems of support services that determine level of intervention.
- Lauren shared the outcomes of the COE's efforts.
